




It was a real joy to have her in the midst of any social function, as one would see her enjoying herself wherever she was in attendance.

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

We closed the club with a great New Year's dance on January 1, 1988 since most of the local members were going to or had moved away and Richard and I were going on holidays in January that year – our 25^{th} anniversary cruise with Jerry and Linda Pierce.

In the fall of 1988 we got together with square dance friends from the Westlock area to start a club at the Hazel Bluff hall just west of Westlock. We called the club the "Hazel Bluff Hilltoppers". Nancy was born in Holland and came to Canada with her family by boat at the young age of about 14 months. She grew up in the small town of Hodgeville SK.


As a seamstress she sewed and designed crests for several sports and hockey clubs all over Alberta.






an extremely competent handyman. He could fix anything!

I know many of you will remember and miss Jack in the Spring and in the Fall when he would pass through, either leaving or entering his winter home in Port Site and other destinations in the USA.




Barbara Bosse





John was born in Coronation, Alberta as one of six children. He outlived them all and is the last of an era of the pioneering families who set out from Ontario to farm in Alberta.

His ability in music led to happy times playing the fiddle for dances in the district. He could play the violin, banjo and keyboard by ear, picking out the melody as he heard it in his head. He also loved to sing and sometimes to compose songs.

John tried various careers – radio repair, interior painter/decorator and refrigeration technology. The latter led to a successful refrigeration repair business named "Cool Flow".

He and his wife Laureen enjoyed trips in their trailer and had lots of good times with their square dance friends. They were part of the group of founding members of the St. Peter's 2x4 Square Dance Club. He would bring his keyboard to special occasions and play while the rest of the dancers enjoyed their dinner. John also ran a scout troop for boys in wheelchairs through St. Peter's church. He and Laureen were married for more than forty years.

Some time after Laureen's passing, John married Marlene Mahon, a square and round dancer. She brought him joy for 7 years until her passing.

In the next few years, he made friends of all ages in Vernon, B.C. He was most proud of the part he played in the Meadow School Project. The teacher teamed up the children from school with the seniors where John lived. The children and the seniors had lots of time to develop intergenerational friendships and understanding. John taught a young fellow to play the banjo. He supported the project and the idea that seniors and children had much to offer each other. Because he was able to express himself so eloquently, he became their spokesperson and spoke at a conference in Vancouver. He spoke movingly about connecting to children heart to heart. He will appear in a film clip that the teacher is taking to a conference in Istanbul.

In the last week of his life, John was determined to take part in a singing competition at his lodge. With help from his friends he was able to get his frail self down to the competition room. Not satisfied to do anything simple, he introduced his number with a short history of square dance music and then launched into a rousing square dance number complete with square dance calls. He was a hit.

Throughout all of his later years, John's mind remained active, his wit sharp, and his curiosity and love of good conversation strong. He wanted his funeral service to be a celebration of the happy times in his long life. He was a remarkable man.

She enjoyed conversational English with new Canadians - the best "job" she ever had, she said. She sewed zippers into countless winter jackets for those in need and knit a similar amount of toques, mitts, and scarves. Crocheting and tatting also filled her spare time.

The first of several times that Ina went on a fall excursion to B.C. with Helen McEachern to gather apples (1,200 pounds of them) she was disappointed. She thought that she would be climbing the trees to pick the apples, but "no", they were to select from a bin where the owner had put them! However, she helped Helen Make apple juice, sauce and other goodies. During our last visit with Ina, just shortly before she passed away, Helen & I enjoyed baked apple pie that Ina had helped make at her granddaughter's home - another memory to treasure.

Ina was quite a philosopher imparting down to earth wisdom to those who visited with her. For example, her knees had bothered her for years, but that did not stop her from dancing. She said that they hurt whether she danced or not, so she might as well dance! When people complained that they would have to stop their activities in order to save themselves for later years, Ina would respond with, "What are you saving yourself for? Enjoy life now!"

Volunteering is a great hobby for her, as it keeps her occupied. "What is the use of my knowing all these things without passing them on?" she speculates. "Can you imagine living a life without making a ripple? I keep waving."

When she's not knitting, weaving or square-dancing, she's actively practicing her philosophy of life.

"To me, life is like a bucket of water," she says. "You can't keep taking water out. You have to put some back.

is a regular at many local clubs, currently belonging to the Swinging Stars, Tait's Twirlers (she's one of their original members), and the Alberta Rhythm Cloggers. Ina did some social dancing years ago with her husband, however, he had a mind of his own (unlike Ina) and was convinced he wouldn't like square dancing. She began square dancing in the early '60's in Saskatoon, began round dancing in Edmonton about 20 years ago, and began clogging here 10 or 11 years ago. She's started a lot of people dancing over the years and has had four regular partners herself. When she has no regular partner, she just "drags strays to come on and dance this one with me."

Ina has a son in Lloydminster, a daughter in Saskatoon, and a daughter in Jamaica. They've given her 9 grandchildren & 7 great grandchildren For the last eleven years, on a volunteer basis, she has been teaching conversational English in the ESL program with Edmonton's Mennonite Centre, four mornings a week. 

A Founding Member of Square Dance Callers Passes Away



Bill Coulter, one of Alberta's oldest and longest calling square and round dance instructors, passed away at the Elk Point Health Center on Sept. 2, 2007

William Nelson Coulter was born in Castor, Alberta on March 15th, 1916. In Timmins, Ontario on October 27th, 1938 he married Kathleen Lindsay, also of Alberta. The couple had two daughters-Donna Dahmer-Chamberland (Paul) and Marlene Krebs(Don).

Bill spent five years working at the Aunor Goldmine in Timmins, Ontario before returning to Wetaskiwin, Alberta to work on the Canadian Pacific Railway for the following 32 years. As a conductor on the CPR, his work took him to many centers in Alberta and Saskatchewan. He retired in 1975 after heart surgery.

In 1950 the Elks Club sponsored Square Dance caller and teacher Ross Haynes and his wife, Laurel, to

ntroduce square dancing in central Alberta. After teaching about 55 squares of dancers n Wetaskiwin and surrounding area, they moved which left the dancers without a caller. Three of the new square dancers took up calling- Bill Coulter, Johnny Trout and Rene' Bequin. Over the next 55 years, Bill called and taught many square dancers in clubs hroughout Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. It was common for Kay to bick Bill up after work and to drive him to a community several hours away so that he could call for a club and then drive home in the wee hours of the morning.. He also aught square dancing to Phy. Ed students at the Strathcona High School for twenty-six rears. As a member of the Square Dance Association in Alberta and the Callers Association in Edmonton, he was one of the founding members of the square dance movenent in Alberta. In 2005 his health forced him to quit calling. After so many years of square, round, and line dancing, he really missed both it and the many friends that he and Kathy had made.

Bill also was very musical and had an old -time orchestra,. He began playing in his Uncle's band at the age of twelve and he played several instruments by ear - the violin, banjo, guitar, saxophone and drums. His orchestra, the Country Cousins, played at numerous weddings and anniversaries as well as at many lodges and long-term care facilities for seniors.

Bill and Kay sold their home in Edmonton in June of 2007 and moved to Elk Point to live with their daughter and her husband. While in hospital in Elk Point to check into the cause of his poor balance, Bill had a serious fall and suffered a brain hemorrhage. He passed away on Sept. 2, 2007 at 91 years of age. He shall be missed by friends and family and the square dance community.

He attended "Callerlab" at Kansas City, Missouri. and for 31 years at the "Banf Institute". He has attended many National Conventions and almost all of the Albert Conventions.

Bill still calls regularly for the West Edmonton Seniors and does guest calling as well a being involved in teaching line dancing. Bill continues to enjoy the activity, meeting people, the classes and the music.

We believe Bill had some kind of a record. He started modern square dance lessons in Wetaskiwin, Central Alberta in 1950 from a caller-teacher Ross Hayes.

Kay convinced Bill to go the first night of the lessons and after that he was sold on square dancing, as were the rest of the 30 plus squares who made up the class. The next year in 1951 Ross Hayes conducted a "Caller School" and Bill was a natural having been an accomplished musician for years with a good sense of rhythm and a nice voice. That season, callers were in great demand, and Bill called for several clubs regularly in the Wetaskiwin area. He's called Provost, Stettler, Coronation, Ponoka, Morningside, Leduc, Red Deer, Beverly and Edmonton the early years, later he was invited to many locations in Alberta as well as across Canada.

In 1956 Bill was asked to call in Edmonton for Parkallen Buttons & Bows which the the longest running club in Edmonton and District. Bill was the Club Caller until 1987. Many years during that time Bill, was a great believer in having a separate night of the week for new dancers. Over the years he was the club Caller for a number of different clubs in the city as well some out of town places.

Over the years, Bill has been MC at many Jamborees such as Grand Prairie Jamboree and called at the Penticton Jamboree several times and was MC as well. Bill was a leader and attended the Alberta Square Dance Institute at Banff every year but one since 1955 to the Institutes end in 1999. Bill is Honorary Charter Member of the Central Alberta Square Dance Callers Association, which started in 1952. Since moving to Edmonton in 1957, he has been an active member of the Edmonton and District Callers Association.

Bill was on the Program Committee of the First Canadian National Square Dance Convention held in Edmonton in 1978, and called at the second CNSDC in Ottawa, Ont. 1980.

We learned square dancing from Bill Coulter with the Parallen Buttons and Bows in the basement of St. John's Anglican Church in 1973. We enjoyed the lesson so much that we returned the next fall to take them again and to act as angels to the newer dancers. After we had been dancing for a few years with the club at Parkallen School, and were elected president couple of the club, we got to know the Coulters quite well. We started inviting them, with a few other couple, to our house after dances for a glass of wine or two and they became like second parents to us. Their's was one of the few places we could drop in at unannounced and we were always warmly received with a cup of coffee and some of Kathy's tasty cookies.

Kathleen (Kay/Kathy) Coulter was born September 30, 1916 in Consort, Alberta. She passed away Tuesday, May 29, 2012 at the Elk Point Hospital at the age of 95 years.

Kay was the middle of three daughters, born to Lloyd and Ethel Lindsay. Ethel Lindsay passed away of the 1918 Flu Epidemic, 9 days after giving birth to her third daughter. As a result, Kay and her sisters were raised by a loving father, grand-parents, a maternal aunt and hired housekeeper. Kay was able to complete her schooling by living with her older sister Dorothy, step-sister Jesse Whitney, her Uncle Stan and Aunt Helen Lindsay, and a friend-Ella Thomas.

Jerry Dreger 1915 - 2000



On December 23, 2000 we said farewell to a long time member of the Square dance Fraternity, Jerry Dreger was born May 17, 1915 at Camrose, Alberta. Jerry with his wife Lily commenced square dancing in 1950 by learning from square dance records and continued as he was able until last December.

In 1952 the Edmonton Recreation Department started holding square dance classes which the Dregers joined. Soon they were involved in or instigated a number of Square Dance groups, such as McKeran Merry Macs, Metro Pals, Belles & Beaus, and Parkallen Buttons & Bows. In 1955 Parkallen presented them with a Life Membership badge for their contribution to and promotion of square dancing at the Club, EDSDA, Federation and National levels. Extra Dance was started by them and their caller son, Ken - Edmonton's 1st workshop club.

In 1956, while camping at Alberta Beach, with Jim & Jo Harris, Frank & Dorothy Dorward, Ivan & Eileen Sheppy they decided to

form a family summer camping and dancing group - thus began the Wandering Squares of Alberta.

As parents, Jerry & Lily were strong supporters of a group of teen dancers which started in the Harris' basement then in 1960 moved to Parkallen School. This evolved into the popular Teen Eighters.

In September of 1967 Jerry and Lily helped to initiate the Alberta Federation (ASRDF) in conjunction with the Wandering Squares "Centennial" Square Dance held at Stettler. They served terms on EDSDA as Dance Directors, as representatives for Alberta Square Dance Institute held in Banff and were also on the executive of the 1st Canadian National Square & Round Dance Convention held in Edmonton in 1978 at which time the Canadian Society was formed. In 1987 they were Honorary Patrons at Penticton Jamboree.

The Alberta Provincial magazine "Squaring Around Alberta" was first published by the Dregers with the help of their friends as a means to spread the news and helped in the formation of the Alberta Square & Round Dance Federation. The Dreger's collection of Square Dance Badges from around the world speaks eloquently of their interest and support. A great amout of appreciation is due to Jerry and Lily for their leadership and devotion to the Square and Round Dance fraternity.

Jerry and Lily owned and operated the successful Dreger's Kitchen Corner and were Canada's first Certified Kitchen Designers.



Peter and Kathy Dyck joined the Mill Woods Country Sunshiners in the 1987-88 dance year. They were vice president couple the following year in 1988-1989 and president couple in 1989-1990. They were the first Vice President Couple to become President Couple: a trend setter for subsequent years. They were the past president couple the following year. Peter was asked to start a history book of the Club, a small request but a large undertaking. A rough draft was finished in 1991 which was later put into a binder still referred to. Peter and Kathy were involved in making the first Barn Dance in June 1987 a huge success at Arthur and Margaret Ziegler's farm near Vegreville. The club had its first New Year's Eve Dance with Jerry Pierce and Barry Sjolin at Leefield Hall on December 31, 1990. Kathy designed the logo for the "club" sweatshirt as well as a new T-shirt and an apron featuring a barn and sunset designed for the Barn Dance.

Kathy was born November 12, 1946 and was raised on a small farm near Creelman, Saskatchewan. She attended the Sequin one-room country schoolhouse for the first 8 years of her education, then bussed 10 miles to Creelman to complete high school. She attended the University of Regina, pursing a degree in Education and Art. Upon graduation, she became a teacher. Over the span of her 30 year career, Kathy taught junior high art and French, as well as general studies for Kindergarten to grade 4 students. Following her retirement, Kathy taught in a part-time capacity at the Centre for Literacy in Edmonton.



Kathy was always creating. She was introduced to art at an early age and went on to study art in both formal and informal settings throughout her life. In particular, she was attracted to watercolours which allowed her to experiment with many subjects and styles.

Kathy also enjoyed writing. As a young girl, she would make up poetry as she walked to school, even designing booklets of her poems accompanied by illustrations. She won several Remembrance Day essay contests in Saskatchewan - the prize money allowing her to purchase clothes for school. As an adult, Kathy contributed at least 10 articles to Lendrum Grace Nots, include a Christmas story based on her real life experiences in a one-room schoolhouse entitled, "The Joy of Christmases Past".

In 1986, Kathy married Peter Dyck at Strawberry Creek Lodge with Pastor Peter Remple officiating. In 1996, they adopted their daughter Angelina. Becoming a mother had been a life-long dream for Kathy and so Angelina's presence in their lives was a special gift.

She was a faithful participant in the Tuesday morning Coffee & Conversation group, touching the lives of many people in so many ways.

Kathy died on April 6, 2023. She is survived by her husband, Peter, her daughter Angelina, her stepdaughter Cecile, her three brothers, Jim, Mitch and Doug and her 3 nephews and a niece: Jesse, Ben, Anna, Lyle. MARGARET LUNDGREN (ELIASSON) 1914 - 2011

Margaret Yvonne Lundgren was born on October 27th, 1914 in Meeting Creek, Alberta to the parents of Karl (Charlie) and Gerda (Svenson) Melin. She moved to Sweden with her parents when she was four and returned to the Meeting Creek area when she was eleven. At the age of fourteen she moved to Edmonton to support herself. She married Mons Eliasson, a railroader, when she was nineteen and had two sons, Leonard and Glen. Margaret's heritage was very important to her. She shared her knowledge and musical ability teaching Swedish songs and folk dancing. The folk dance group she led was performed at the official opening of the Jubilee Auditorium.

She joined the **Vasa Order of America** in 1931 and held various positions in local lodge, provincial and internation lodge. In 1965 she was presented with a **Jewel** from the Swedish District Lodges #19 and 20 recognizing her work with the Children's' Clubs in North America. Up until then it was the only one presented in Canada.

Margaret and her husband Mons served on the Scandinavian Centre Co-operative Association's first board of directors. Positions they held until Mons retired in 1968, when they moved to Vernon, B.C. Mons drowned in the Shuswap River in September, 1968 and a year later Margaret moved back to Edmonton.

In her travels she met a potato farmer from Pemberton, B.C. and on February 4th, 1972 she married Bert Lundgren. What a way to get a daughter she had wished for! They enjoyed music, dancing and travelling; camping throughout B.C. and Alberta. They spent many evenings with Margaret playing the piano and singing, and Bert playing the accordion. After the Circle Eights folded, Fred and Ada joined the Whirlaways on October 17, 1975.




She also danced Plus, A1, A2, and rounds Phase 2, 3, 4, & 5 with her former partner Wally Wychopen.

Nov 12, 1929-Aug 26, 2018






On April 2nd, 2023, Bob Fyfe of Boyle passed away at the age of 85.


Square dancing became a very important part of Pearl's life as did the Round dancing and Clogging. Pearl was also a marvelous social dancer.







Many of us have attended her workshops in Edmonton, Calgary and Banff annually and sometimes twice a year since the mid 1980's. Following is a brief account of her clogging history from an article written by Maureen and Tom Dakers for their clogging workshop Syllabus in 1997.

"Marilyn started clogging in 1979 and caught the teaching bug shortly thereafter. Marilyn taught in Southern California at all levels from Beginners through Advanced. She has taught at numerous local, State and National Conventions and was a prolific choreographer of clogging

routines. Clogging took Marilyn on many trips around the United States and Canada. As well she and her husband, Lee Schmidt led numerous trips and cruises with square dancers and cloggers. She judged competitive clogging and was involved in preparing dancers for clogging competitions. Marilyn produced her own line of clogging video tapes for home instruction. She also taught line dancing in Southern California"

Marilyn is survived by her husband, Lee Schmidt, a well-known square dance caller, one son, two daughters and a long line of hundreds of happy cloggers.



IN MEMORIAM Marie Genevieve (Curley) Hayley 1915 - 2002




Marie passed away November 29, 2002. She was born in Vernon River, P.E.I., the eldest of five children.


She is survived by sister-in-law Glynis (Jim).

Al was born in Edmonton, at 11344-93St and grew up as the youngest in a family of 3 boys. Allan first attended a small two room school called Sherbrooke. He then attended Alec Taylor, Richie, and King Edward Schools. In later years, it is unique how Al & Vi were members of a square dance club called Sherbrooke Shuffling 8's.

Allan started an apprenticeship program in sheet metal business at Barry Sheet Metal Co. In September 1946 he joined the RCAF as a radio technician then started training that November at Centralia Air Base -here he met Vi. This training was finished at Clinton Air Base in 1948. Al's career was in telecommunications for fighter planes. Al's stationing included an early but short posting at Calgary, then St Hubert, Que; Odham, England; Chatham, N.B.; Hamilton, Ont.; Cold Lake, AB., Baden Baden, Germany and for a second time to Cold Lake. While stationed for last time in Cold Lake, he was also a radio announcer for a while.

Dancer Profile Vi and Al Holts

It is a pleasure to recognize Vi and Al Holts, two friendly, enthusiastic and devoted people, that have been dancing in the EDSDA for more than 16 years.

Al started square dancing when he was a teenager and he and Vi started their dancing career together with the Whirlaways Club in 1980. They attended the same church as Dick Nicols sister and were encouraged to join in the fun. They took their lessons from Dick and supported the club as members of the decorating committee.

The Holts began dancing at Sherbrooke Shufflin' Eights for extra practise and joined that club in 1981. Once again they became committed volunteers and held almost continuous executive positions from then until now to support the growth of the club. Vi and Al were treasurer couple from 1983 to 1985. They became vice president couple in 1986 and they were the president couple in 1987, followed by a term as past presidents in 1988. Vi and Al have attended every Provincial Convention since 1982 (12 in all). They went to the National in 1988 and in 1996. They attended 4 International Conventions in Regina (1988), Aberdeen, South Dakota (1989), Rapid City, South Dakota (1991) and Regina once again in 1996. The Holts received recognition from their club for their outstanding commitment to the club through the presentation of Old Faithful Badges (meaning they missed NO dances at all throughout the scason). They were awarded Old Faithful badges in 1983, '84, '85, '86, '87, '88, '91, '92, and 1993. When they did not receive the badge, it was because they missed only one dance.

Vi and Al have been outstanding supporters of new dancers, acting as angel couples every year new dancers have joined the club. They continue to support club promotion through visitations to other clubs, often twice a week and sometimes three times a week over and above the regular dance schedule. They look at the sign-up sheets and always add their name to ensure their club has a full square going out on visitation. Having served as president couple twice, they know the importance of visitations to ensure a club is able to have return dancers especially throughout the winter season.

The 1994 Provincial Convention saw Vi and Al working with Stan and Del Turner to promote the Convention all over the entire province (at their own expense). They worked long hours prior to, during and after the Convention to ensure registrations were handled with expertise and attended to any additional jobs that were necessary throughout the duration of the convention. The success of that Convention was a tribute to the dedication and commitment of people like Vi and Al.

They look for where they may be needed and pitch in and help, working turns in the kitchen, assisting on numerous committees while heading up others or holding executive positions. They're enjoyment of square dancing comes from the fact that it is an open, not closed, community. There is no class distinction. You can be a Doctor, Lawyer, or a Tribal Chief and in square dancing, you are just couple number 1, 2, 3 or 4.

On April 14th, Vi and Al Holts were married for 47 year. They volunteer for meals on wheels twice a week and have worked at the Grey Nuns Hospital as volunteers. They provide transportation for people at their church who would otherwise not be able to attend services and they serve on the Church's Communion Committee. 

It was always fun when we would get out of the sleigh and walk on the hard snow banks higher than the fence lines. A large garden was planted in May, so some of the vegetables were canned in quart ceilers and the rest was stored in a cold room in the basement. Various fresh fruits were also canned up to 200 ceilers. Meats were canned but mostly chicken pieces as her mom raised chickens. Heating the house in the winter, was cutting wood in the summer and Laurene carried it in the house and piled it in the furnace room. In fall, her dad would buy coal from a mine, to use in the kitchen stove and furnace. With no electricity or running water, Laurene carried many, many pails of water for household use. In the fall during harvest, she missed days of school to help her mom with the chores while her dad was out working with the crew threshing in the area. She went to school until grade 10 and an opportunity came to get a job at

the local Post Office where she worked 3 1/2 years. She happened to see a man sitting on a bench, went up to him and to her surprise, was her husband (Rudy's father)! What miracle reunion! He managed to leave the German Army and went from town to town looking for his family. After 2 weeks however, he was captured by the Russians and taken prisoner to a war camp in Poland. He was released after 1 year and went back to his family in Hertzschprung. They left to West Berlin on the west side of Germany. There he began to prepare papers, etc for the family to immigrate. They came to Canada August 1948. Rudy had an uncle living in Barrhead, Alberta and this is where the family settled on a farm. Rudy went to school starting in grade 4, learned the language and worked on the farm. 

As long-time snowbirds, Carol and Jules regularly squared danced while in Yuma, Arizona.


They very much enjoyed going on a square dance cruise where Gary Winter was the caller.

With dignity and grace, Mary bid "Aloha" to her family surrounding her side and departed for her next dance in heaven.



John and Jackie were volunteers for the first Canadian National Convention held in Edmonton in 1978.






Joyce was a member of the United Church and supported it in many different ways such as teaching Sunday School for many years.

Leslie "Wayne" Lowther (April 16, 1934 - March 24, 2024)







Alma Lillian Mahood 1918 - 2008





Doug Maschmeyer 80 Years Old and Still Farming


Born at Lamont and raised on a farm just north of Bruderheim Doug has seen many changes through his 80 year life span. Douglas Maschmeyer has lived his entire life in and around Bruderheim. His main claim to fame is the production of pure bred swine. Pigs enabled him to travel the world through 20 European countries on one trip. and other trips to the Middle East – Japan and Malaysia. He has also travelled all across Canada selling breeding stock to other farmers. He and his son Gerald operate a successful pig, cattle and grain operation 2 miles south of Bruderheim. There is very little market for breeding stock. To survive they have diversified, selling pork to customers for meat. Several different ethnic groups prefer pork to beef. The week prior to Christmas 156 swine carcasses were delivered for Christmas celebrations. In an average week 20 - 25 are butchered, veterinary inspected and sold privately for meat. This eliminates the middle man, thus Hillview Acres survives and customers get a fresh product for dinner.

Over the years Doug volunteered as Sunday School Superintendent at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, led 4H Light Horse Club, announced at Josephburg Gymkhana, was a director at Edmonton Northlands for 12 years, and at present is a director of Josephburg Ag Society helping to organize and host the Presents Concert Series. Always interested in what's happening around him, he is known as Mr. 50/50 and the Idea Guy.

Doug started old time square dancing way back, quit and started again in 1986.Herb and Audrey Rinas encouraged him to participate in modern square dancing. He has enjoyed dancing at several clubs. Merry Mixers is home now but we have fond memories of learning at Bon Accord Kick-a-Poo Kids, and dancing with Golden Slippers as well. It has been a great place to make friends and socialize as well as exercise.

Now as a semi-retired farmer he enjoys spending time with grandchildren, dancing and being the "go-for guy" on the farm.





They happily celebrated their 40th Wedding Anniversary by taking a trip to Hawaii and Australia.


They have a son Barry and daughter Doris and two grandchildren.

Paula left White Stag's comptometer operator position for a better paying job at Safeway. She was just getting as good as the people senior to her when Brian expressed his discomfort with her travelling at night on the bus, eager to have her home so they could do what they wanted when they wanted, especially on weekends. She reluctantly gave up her position at Safeway; however, to ensure she would not be bored in her new homemaker role she taught herself to sew. Paula was often complimented on her dress and she proudly stated that she made all her own clothes and usually from scrap or bargain pieces of material.

Paula and Brian were founding members of the Sherbrook Shufflin Eights Square Dance Club and over the years, they took their turn on the executive more than once. It was during this time that Paula became known as quite a host. She held an annual card party at her home for 17 years. They played mostly crib and military whist. Square Dancing and playing cards quickly became their favorite recreation.

Paula and Brian thoroughly enjoyed camping and spend many weekends on the road travelling to various Club Camp Outs. They travelled with Wandering Squares and enjoyed round dancing as well as plus dancing at clubs throughout Alberta. Paula and Brian also enjoyed travelling abroad. Some of the Square Dance Clubs that they took and active part in were Namao, Circle Eight Club, Crestwood Country Cousins, Larries & Larriettes, Founding members of Hashin' The Breaks, Whirlaways, Spinning Wheels, Fort. Saskatchewan Merry Mixers, Bon Accord Kick A Poo Kids, Morinville Yellow Rockers. Jack and Gladys square danced two and sometimes three times a week right up to the end of the club season in May 2002.

Jack and Gladys were presented with a Long Service Award in the fall of 2000 for their dedication to the square dance movement, also the oldest square dancing couple in Canada by Dr Ken Glover of the National Square Dance Association.

Jack and Gladys had three children, Audrey, Robert, and Ross, five grandchildren and four great grandchildren of which one carries his name.

Jack and Gladys McLay started dancing in 1944 with the Fort Saskatchewan U-Go-I Go Square Dance Club. The U-Go-I Go Square Dance Club ceased its operation in 1962. In 1964 the club was revived under the name of Fort Saskatchewan Merry Mixers. This club is still active. In 1978, Jack and Gladys were among the founding members of the Bon Accord Kick- A- Poo Kids Square Dance Club.

Presently the McLay's are honorary members of the Bon Accord Kick- A- Poo Kids, the Fort Saskatchewan Merry Mixers, the Morinville Yellow Rock Dancers as well as being honorary members of the Edmonton and District Square Dance Association



Loma was born May 7, 1937 in Edmonton and passed away September 4, 2002 at Bon Accord Alberta.




Bob & Darlene called and attended as many functions as Bob's health permitted. Bob will be missed by the square dance community.

After he lost his wife in 2000, he met his neighbour, Ruth Krebs, and together they had 14 years of companionship, travelling, and dancing.





Gordon served in the Canadian Army and later worked on the Alaska Highway. He worked most of his working life for the Department of Transport.


He was an avid hockey player and played Community hockey into his 70's. He passed away on December 16, 2011 at 92 yrs of age.

to accept the things I cannot Change, the courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference. God bless.












Bill Degroot wrote:



EDSDA/EDCIA CUER RECEIVES DISTINCTION

In 1981. Dan and Sandy Angel founded America's Clogging Hall of Fame as a national organization recognizing past and present leaders of clogging. Since then, two or three deserving American cloggers

have been inducted into it annually. This year, America's Clogging Hall of Fame announced the first International Clogging Team. Sixteen dancers were appointed to this team: 3 from Germany; 3 from the Czech Republic; 2 from Australia; 1 from Belgium; 2 from England; and 5 from Canada.

EDSDA/EDCIA's own Hope Pennock was one of those honoured. "We commend you on your dedication to and love for a dance native to the Southern Appalachian Mountains in the United States of America. You have been singled out by your peers for having helped take clogging into the far corners of your homeland", stated the Officers and Board of Directors for the Hall of Fame, in a letter to recipients.

Hope flew down to receive this honour and enjoy leaf turning season, the hospitality of the south, and clogging. 3,000 cloggers were gathered that

weekend for the Annual America's Clogging Hall of Fame Dance Off at Stompin' Ground in Maggie Valley, Here Hope saw a North Carolina. wealth of clogging styles from precision clogging (most similar to what we do here in Edmonton) to freestyling by the Rough Creek Cloggers who dance to live music, each piece lasting at least 8 The traditional Southern minutes. Appalachian formations cued by a cuer with no microphone within the set, are done with precision by the dancers while their feet are freestyling whatever step seems appropriate to them at the time.


The award is an honour but the recipient is no surprise. Hope Pennock is the mother of clogging in Alberta. She brought it back from Ontario after seeing it in 1980 and '82 at the Canadian National Square and Round Dance Conventions in Ottawa and Halifax There, Dorothy and Jack respectively. McCulloch (two fellow recipients of this prestigious award), introduced Hope, and husband Andy, to what Hope now refers to as "our kind of fun". She began classes in her basement for Andy and Deane and Gord Evans. At the time she knew only 4 or 5 steps! In 1984, Hope and Andy founded the Alberta Rhythm Cloggers with 14 determined cloggers. Today, she teaches 5 levels of cloggers

through the Alberta Rhythm Cloggers (who number currently about 130), and another class through Edmonton Public Schools Continuing Education. Alberta Rhythm Cloggers Hope Pennock's Clogging Club

Hope <u>STOMPIN' GROUND</u> Pennock <u>MAGGIE VALLEY, NORTH CAROLINA</u>

The Annual America's Clogging Hall of Fame Dance Off at Stompin' Ground Maggie Valley, North in Carolina is for real and the event is unreal! Everyone should see it - not for the competition aspect, but for the energy, talent, and fun it displays. What can I say? I am still in awe over a new exciting clog style presented and predominately by children, teens, and adults under age 35. My wish would be to pick up the entire weekend and set it down in Alberta for all to see. What an inspiration!

The competition was amongst cloggers who had placed first or second at recent competitions, so we were seeing exceptional talent. A few years ago, there were only two competition categories - Freestyle and Precision. The popularity of this dance form has evolved into several competitive categories -Mountain Square Smooth Dance, Country Hoe down, Open 6 or 8 Couple Freestyle, Four Couple Precision. Southern Appalachian Traditional. Hoedown, Running Set Exhibition Dance, Show - to name a few. We were told that there were more entries this year than ever before. From 8:30 a.m. on Saturday to 12:20 a.m. on Sunday and again 9:00 a.m. to 4:20 p.m. Sunday, one entry after another presented their carefully choreographed and diligently practiced routines. The only breaks were

during the presentation of first, second, and third place winners at the end of each category. The judges certainly had to be super people! Annette and Irene from Germany and Martin and Jarka from the Czech Republic entered and were given honorary trophies. How excited and happy they were!

The Southern Appalachian Traditional clogging include could everyone - the footwork is not taught. Newcomers just watch and interpret the foot movements in their own way. It is called Freestyle. (Our dancing would be called Precision as we do the same steps at the same time.) It is the formations that are carefully taught so the original, traditional movements are preserved and learned correctly. The devotion and enthusiasm of people like Dan and Sandy Angel, Bob and Cora Mae Phillips and Rough the Creek Cloggers for encouraging and teaching the original moves is very obvious and to be admired.

The Phillips took us to their regular Friday night Rough Creek Cloggers dance which is held in a large hotel's dance hall as entertainment for hotel guests (great idea!) After the initial shock of watching six couples (some of whom were in their seventies) clog lickety-split for eight minutes, we were invited one at a time to dance with them. The dancers respond to the Southern Appalachian moves cued without a microphone by the caller who What exhilarating fun! dances. One commonality with many Edmonton dancers is that we went for coffee and something to eat after!

Stompin' Ground, a huge dance hall built by a clogger, Kyle Edwards and his family, is home to the American Hall of Fame which was formed in 1981 by Dan and Sandy Angel of Toccoa, Georgia. Each year one, two or three Americans are inducted into the Hall of Fame "for their dedication to and love for Southern Appalachian Clogging". This year Garland Steele, Sandy Angel, and Ralph Pierce were chosen. Also, each year an All-American team is selected and honored at a Spring function. 1995 is the first year that an International Team has been selected to recognize instructors who have introduced clogging in their countries -Germany, Czech Republic, Belgium, Australia, England and Canada. Dorothy and Jack McCulloch of Cambridge, Ontario (who introduced clogging to Canadians and to Andy and I), Linda Ross of Windsor, Ont. Judy Wood (who could not attend) of Fredericton, New Brunswick, and myself were chosen from Along with two ladies from Canada. Germany and a couple from the Czech Republic, we clogged, were individually introduced. and were presented certificates at the evening competitions. White satin jackets embroidered with

Hope Pennock -page 2 who also International Clogging Team 1995 and personalized with our name and club. were offered to us on a preorder basis and were very special to wear. Our little group developed quite a camaraderie in the few hours we were together and all felt honored and pleased to be chosen for the First International Clogging Team.

> Dan Angel had several responsibilities, but managed to keep an eye on all of us to make certain that we were happy and were well-informed about his beloved Southern Appalachian Traditional Clogging. He was at the airport at 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. to meet airplanes, then gathered us together for breakfasts, practices and rides. He was everywhere!

> Another thrill was to meet Bobbie Adams, the editor of the Double Toe Times, who treated us to breakfast. She is a very knowledgeable and hardworking lady.

> Wrap all of these features together with a blanket of fall colors spread over the Appalachian Mountains, sprinkle with friendly folks, grits, biscuits and gravy, and numerous quaint craft shops, and tie with new clogging friendships - wonderful! It was a short stay for the distance travelled, but thanks to the encouragement of friends and family, I went and I am glad! It was more than worthwhile!

In 1974, Dalton & Trudy got the teens that were dancing with the club and started precision dancing under the direction of Don & June Foster. The teens would all bike out to the hall for the dance lessons and bike into town for coffee. The precision dance group danced for the jamboree in 1974. Also in 1974, Dalton became the club caller for the Entrance Square Dance Club.

1975 was the clubs 20th anniversary, at the Saturday night dance at the jamboree Dalton came out of the cake dressed as a girl. On April 24, 1977, Dalton called for the Dawson Creek Jamboree for the Chixs & Chuxs. A texas mickey was raffled off the night of the dance and Jack Roy won the mickey and guess where the party was, it ended up at the Roy residence.

On the Labour Day weekend in 1977 at the Lethbridge Convention, Dalton met his future wife.

In 1978, Dalton called at the first National Convention. Shortly after the convention, Trudy met Reece Bergstrom. Reece took lessons and graduated in 1979. Reece and Trudy were married July 14, 1979. Dalton was the bestman for the wedding.

In February of 1979, the Yellowhead games were held in Hinton. The local square dance club joined in the games by holding a dance at the high school. The night of the games a square of teens came up from Quenel B.C.and drove back the same night in a snow storm.

In August of 1979, Dalton called at Penticton at the street dance. That year Dalton was on T.V. calling and both of us were in the paper.

On March 29, 1980, Dalton called for the Blueberry Moonshiners and the Woking Whirlers jamboree at Rycroft, Alberta. It had rained in the afternoon and the mud that was brought into the hall by the dancers turned into dust. They swept the floor three times and the fourth time they used dust bane on the floor and the sound improved.

On June 14, 1980, Dalton Roy married Faye Bowdige in Edmonton, Alberta at Luther Place Lutheran Church, officiated by Rev. Rober Pearson. Our attendants were made up of family and square dance friends. The attendants were my sister Elaine(Sverdadl) Roberts, Ida Burns(Murray), Trudy Bergstrom and Maureen Evers(Dakers). Our groomsmen were George Bunning, Faye's brother Don Bowdige, Dalton's nephew Wesley Poffenroth and Russell Manchester. My brother Laurence

Bowdige and Dalton's brother Blane Roy were our ushers. Paul Busch was our M.C. Our wedding was supposed to be a little family gathering. Well this little family gathering ended up to be 200 people.

We called in Penticton on our honeymoon, Dalton called Wednesday night. When Dalton was standing by the stage waiting for his turn, he turned and said to me "I can't remember how Sweet Fantasy goes". But once the needle went on the record he remembered how the singing call went. We looked across the front row of the dance floor and all we could see was Albertans. What a sight! Dalton did a fantastic job of calling. I was so proud. As some of the callers were congratulating him I stood in the background and cried. This was one of the most memorable years.

Also in 1980 we called at the Calgary Stampede and the Alberta Convention. At all three of these dances the record that Dalton was informed to call was Sweet Fantasy. We left the record in the truck and it warped. Jack (Dalton's dad) had a Sweet Fantasy record so we were okay.

In the fall of 1981, Dalton called at Barrierir B.C.

On the May long weekend in 1982, Dalton and Faye were flown up to Yellowknife, N.W.T. to call for their jamboree.

In the fall of 1982 the Hinton Belles and Beaus Square Dance Club was formed and Dalton was asked to call for the club. This club consisted of children from the ages of 6 or 12 years of age.

In October of 1982, Dalton was the fist caller to call for the Parkallen Button and Bow's "Spook Dance". He was a mystery caller that night. We went as Indians. I kept losing my fringe on the dress I was wearing. Dalton suddenly became fatter than what he was, with the help of a pillow.

December 1982, Dalton was hired on at Gregg River Resources, where he worked as a automotive mechanic. On April 1983, we called the Little Smoky Jamboree.

A little later in April, Dalton called for the Lacombe club on the Friday evening. He had a cold that night, every thing went fine but on Sunday afternoon Dalton called in Lac La Biche and lost his voice completely. The only time he got a break form calling was when the president made an announcement. Dalton & Faye called for both clubs again in 1984.

On April 2, 1984 a bunch of the Hinton dancers wanted to get their Jail Bird badge. So after the dance it was arranged to dance in the drunk tank at the jail. All had a good time.

In 1985, the mine rescue team Dalton was on participated at the 5th annual Provincial Surface Mine Rescue Competition. This competition was held in Hinton.

In the summer of 1986, the new pool at Miette Hot Springs opened. The square dance club danced for the opening. Dalton again did the calling. Also in July of 1986 the National Square Dance Convention was held in Calgary. This was the last Canadian Convention that we would have the opportunity to attend.

The square dance club also participated in the opening of the Grande Cache to Grande Prairie highway opening in 1987. The highway was completed in 1996 with it being all paved from Grande Cache to Grande Prairie.

In August of 1988, Dalton and I had the privilege to M.C. the Penticton Square Dance Jamboree. We were the Thursday night M.C.s. At the Penticton Jamboree there were approximately 2000 dancers on the dance floor for this week long event. All dances are outside on a baseball field that is covered with plywood, unless it rains then they are held indoors at the Peach Bowl. At this jamboree Allan was 5, Jennifer was 4 & Daniel was 6 weeks old.

They were the Edmonton Region Winners, that then moved them into the competition in Red Deer. On April 28, 1990 they won the Provincial Championship winning the highest Aggregate and the Senior mixed.

In August of 1990, the Alberta Senior Games were hosted in Hinton. We got the honor of being M.C. for the dance competition. Dalton had a ball doing this. He was always very gifted whenever he got to M.C.

Dalton and I were always noted for forgetting something at home whenever we travelled. The times we always forgot something were usually when the Murray's or the Minn's were around. One year it was out outfits. (This was Dalton's fault as Faye didn't know the outfits were taken out of the van and left hanging in the closet at Rimbey. The other time was at convention 1990 in Red Deer. Faye must admit that she did forget to pack Dalton's pants in the trailer. So guess who got new pants to wear.

On April 11-13, Dalton and I, along with Willie and Sue Minns, drove down to Vancouver for the 21st National Callerlab Convention. This was the first time the Convention was hosted in Canada. And yes, we did forget something again. We forgot our bathing suits in the motel at Harrison Hot Springs. During this week Faye got her nickname that for some reason she just can't seem to shake off.

In 1995, Dalton started calling for the Edson Twirlers. He called bi-weekly on Fridays. In 1995 & in 1996 the Edson Twirlers hosted the Emeralds to play in Edson. Dalton called square dancing at the one in 1996 as in 1995 Dalton was recovering from having his first brain tumor removed.

In 1995 the mine rescue team Dalton was on again won at the Provincial Surface Mine Rescue Competition at Fort McMurray. They won 1st in Smokehouse, Spareman & Pan Fires and 3rd in Field Competition. Dalton was unable to be there, but did share in the glory by phone. In June of 1995, Faye and Dalton celebrated their 15th wedding anniversary at Pine Bay on Jarvis Lake. Dalton and Faye renewed their wedding vows in front of a host of friends, by Rev. Bill Bulger.

In September of 1995, Dalton and I called for the EDSDA Kick-Off dance in Edmonton. We also went to the Kick-Off dance in Calgary where the Minns were calling and then to Red Deer for the Caller's meeting for Saturday and Sunday.

In May of 1996, we were one of three couples that travelled down to Lynnwood Washington to chaperone 9 teenagers who were competing at the Teen Festival. The teens won first in 3 divisions of the competition. The weather was wonderful on the way down but on the way home, the closer we got to Alberta, the worse the weather became. We came home to Hinton to about 3 feet of wet snow. I really wanted to go back where they had sunshine but Dalton wouldn't let me, seeing how he had to work.

In August again we travelled down to the Penticton Square Dance Jamboree. This was the last major event that Dalton would attend.

This year (1997(Dalton would have been celebrating his 25th year of square dance calling. If his health hadn't failed we would have flown down to the Callerlab Convention in Los Angeles to receive this Quarter Century Award Certificate.

Other clubs that Dalton and I have called for have been the Spinning Set Squares, Happy Homesteaders, Edmonton Single Squares, Mill Woods Country Sunshiners, Bandalaro's and the Sherbrooke Shufflin 8's.

Dalton loved singing, he enjoyed life to the fullest, he was always a friend to everyone, and he always knew how to make people laugh. He will be sadly missed but forever remembered, until we are joyfully reunited in heaven


Doris Shirley Rye




Lorne was born and raised in the Stony Plain community. He married Pat in 1963 and together they raised their three children: Mark, Terry and Lori – Anne, in his home community.

Blessed be his memory.



He joined the navy in 1941 as a boy seaman, and spent 4 years on the North Atlantic during WW II. He became an ASDIC operator (submarine detector) in 1942. In January of 1944, John detected a torpedo heading for his ship, the watch officer ordered the ship hard to starboard, to the bearing John gave him. The torpedo missed the ship, but the ship hit the submarine and damaged it. This happened not far from Halifax.

When war broke out in Korea, John tried to join the navy, but the navy was not recruiting at that time, so John joined the army. On November 21, 1950 John was on his way to Korea, when the troop train that he was on was hit head on by a passenger train from Vancouver, 10 km south of Valemount, B.C. John was on the first car that didn't go off the track. 17 soldiers and the 4 train crewmen were killed.

In Korea he was with the 2RCHA. After Korea, John married Jackie and stayed with the army. He was attached to RCEME, Black Watch, and PPCLI. While with the Black Watch, he spent 4 years in Germany. He was honourably discharged from the army in 1971 and moved to Fort McMurray. In Fort Mac he taught mechanics in Keyano College.


Rosamond and Duke Stafford




Arthur Henry Strawson 1928 - 2004




Larry Stinsman


January 11th, 2006

Pat & Bill Tait (1996) WILLIAM IRVING TAIT

November 14, 1920 – January 8, 2011

Bill touched and influenced many lives in a positive and happy way. Here are some thoughts from a few of his many friends within the dancing community:

From Doris Buryn, Round Dance Instructor

So much of what we enjoy today in the square dance world is built on things that were put in place by people who have gone before. Bill Tait, was a caller and round dance teacher who did so much to set the stage for all we enjoy today. He and Pat helped organize and were strong supporters of EDCIA, EDSDA, Round Dance Council and the first National Convention.

Bill started calling in eastern Canada and when he and Pat arrived in Edmonton in about 1964, he was put to work immediately. Bill had a great voice and rhythm and was very pleasant and enthusiastic, so he was always fun to dance to.

There were no round dance clubs at that time. Round dances were taught just at the square dances. In 1966 some dancers talked Bill and Pat into teaching rounds on a separate night. They started the Tait's Twirlers – dancing the first year in their basement. As the club grew, they moved to school gyms. They always taught new dancers, but soon the dancers wanted more challenge so an advanced group was started on a separate night. For many years, Taits taught 3 nights of rounds as well as calling for the St Peters's 2 x 4's.

Bill and Pat not only taught hundreds of people to round dance, but they taught and encouraged many leader couples. There was a time when almost all of the members of round dance council were people who had spent some time in their club.

Banff Institute was the only source of training for callers and cuers in the 60s and 70s and the Taits attended the sessions regularly. They would learn the dances and the basics, then come back and share what they'd learned with all of the other leaders.

In the rest of his life, Bill was a devoted husband and father. His family of one son and twin daughters and then grandchildren were his pride and delight. His work in Edmonton was in the accounting department of a Tire company. He was very active in the Anglican Church where he was a lay reader and choir member for many years. He also did many hours of volunteer work. The most memorable one was the walk he did every year in the spring to support UNICEF.

I am finding it hard to put thoughts together about Bill Tait without it just sounding like a list of facts. I feel so strongly that he set the tone for so much of what Norm and I did in the years we worked with Tait Twirlers. But I can't seem to put that down and maybe that is just a treasured memory for me.....

- 1. Most dancers are not really aware of the hours of work callers and cuers put in preparing their programs. Bill was not only a hard worker but a real worrier, yet came to the dances and taught and called and cued with a big smile as if it was very easy.
- 2. He always had time to encourage others to learn to call and to teach rounds.
- 3. Bill willingly took on the chair position for the dance program of the 1st Canadian Square Dance Convention. Along with the callers from U.S.A. Aust./Japan and Canada there were the many levels of dance to deal with which also led to how many black plastic tarps to partition off separate rooms at Rexall Place.
- 4. The Tait's often opened their home for club "after parties". A social part of square dancing that helped to bond friendships.
- 5. Off the dance floor Bill loved to experience the beauty of western Canada. May long weekend became a camping weekend and dancers were welcome to join in. Eventually this became a club event. Hiking and canoeing were also enjoyed by this very active man.

Some Thoughts to Remember BILL TAIT

It was about 1974 when I first started dancing with Bill. He was calling for the St. Peter's 2x4's and along with his wife Pat, made sure that we perfected our skills and learned to enjoy the sociability of square dancing. His easy going personality made him the perfect teacher, his certain way of correcting students without ever talking down to anyone.

His ability to make everyone feel comfortable set him apart. He was able to take a joke, such as the night be called "Firedrill" and everyone left the hall, or the times when his sound system would break up in the middle of a dance because someone outside keyed up a C.B. radio causing certain static in his player.

For ten years, Bill and Pat organized and ran a camp for square and round dancers on the May long weekend at the Overlander Lodge, just outside the Jasper Park gates.

Pat's first job was to assign couples to the several cabins where she always managed to put different couples together every year. A very good way for everyone to get to know their fellow dancers a little better. The weekend consisted of workshops, dances, community meals and always lots of free time to hike the surrounding mountains and trails. Saturday night was after party night, with everyone dressed in garb that indicated what year they joined the group.

For all the time spent making square and round dancing enjoyable for the dancers, he didn't neglect the newer callers and helped to bring along what has turned out to be some of the best callers in the country.

What a pleasure to have known & danced with the Taits.

THE KIDNAPPING ESCAPADE

Andy's first position with the 2x4's was to teach and call for the new dancers – a great two year session with four squares of eager, creative members. After graduation, the decision was made to invade the Overlander 2x4 Campout of experienced dancers without their knowledge. The Overlander is near Jasper. We spent hours working out devious plans one of which was to 'kidnap' Pat. Our cabins were separate from the original group, so a car load of us were able to pluck Pat away and take her to our cabin. 
From Murray and Barb Few, Square Dance Caller Couple

In 1971, Bill asked us to call for the new dancers of the St. Peter's 2x4s Club. That association continued until 1976.



We had 58 happy years of marriage & raised seven children – 2 sons – 5 daughters. John was also very proud of his 15 grandchildren.


He had his own tile & marble company, was President of Edmonton Construction Ass'n., Provincial teacher, inspector & was still working with son.

We celebrate the life of Kenneth Peter Thomas, February 2, 1953-September 16, 2024. Ken was known by many as a music lover, athlete, community builder and activist for persons with disabilities. Ken was born to Sheila and Alan Thomas in Calgary, Alberta. A medical error lead to Ken's cerebral palsy, a condition which affected his coordination and speech but not his mind. The family, having lived in Calgary and Lethbridge, moved to Edmonton in 1965 where Ken resided for the rest of his life. Ken's cheerfulness, willing participation and positive attitude was acknowledged in 1974 when staff at the Glenrose Hospital School presented him with the Dr. J. E. Bradley Citizenship Award. This was but the first of many awards, including those for athletics. Ken competed in the sport of wheelchair track on a national and international basis from 1981-1994 winning many trophies and medals, including two from the Paralympics in Seoul, Korea in 1988 for the 100 and 400 meter race. Ken's website "Backwheeler.ca" gives away his signature style of racing backwards. Because Ken could not use his hands he also had a signature style of typing- with his nose!

The number of letters and reports he typed with his nose while on the following Board of Director's is so impressive: Cerebral Palsy Association in Alberta (1978-1984); Alberta Committee of Citizens with Disabilities (1979-1985); first President of the Alberta Cerebral Palsy Sports Association (1979-1994), the City of Edmonton Custom Transportation Services Advisory Board (1985-1990), the Artspace Housing Cooperative Board- VP Maintenance (1994-1998), and the City of Edmonton's Advisory Board for Persons with Disabilities (2005-2011). For his community service he received the Queens Golden Jubilee Medal (2002), Ewan Nelson Mayor's Award for Self-Advocacy (2012), and from the Canadian Paraplegic Association the Honorable Lois Hole Community Development award (2012). For recreation Ken attended Camp He Ho Ha from 1960-1979, and enjoyed swimming at the ACT, Hardisty and YWCA pools. Wheelchair square dancing was a big part of his life for many years, travelling across the country with the Swinging Spokes and then more recently dancing with Double Diamonds Community Dance. Ken was also the man in the wheelchair sitting in the front at many theatre and music events, attending the Edmonton Folk Music Festivals for 43 vears! Ken was a champion for independent living and user-directed car. He lived at the Mcgueen group home (Easter Seals) and then in his own apartment at Artspace Housing Co-op. The Supports for Artspace Independent Living (S.A.I.L.) staff were amazing, particularly in the past three years when he was struggling with pain and limited mobility. Ken is survived by Brian (Genny) Thomas, Lorna Thomas and Phil Haug, Cayley Thomas-Haug, CarrieAnn (Dennis) Dykes, Scott (Erin) Thomas; Anne (Jim) Northey and their children Keller, Finn, Myles and Bridget; cousins in Medicine Hat, Calgary, Camrose, Vancouver Island and Ottawa. He is predeceased by his nephew Alex Thomas-Haug, his parents, grandparents and many aunts, uncles, and cousins. He had a beautiful circle of friends who walked, ran, wheeled and danced beside him throughout his life.



Here is Leola's story in her own words as it was printed in the Promenader a few years ago.

Impossible and the ridiculous have collided. I have been asked to write the story of my life on one page. What nonsense! Generally, there is enough drama in one day to fill a novel. However, this one page limit has forced me to focus on the really dramatic events in my life. One thing became obvious, all of



them were simply there or someone thought that I could or should do it and I tumbled into another adventure. Do I want to write this chronicle? No, but Wally Paplinski has been on my case for weeks to do this.

I was born in Lac La Biche in a house with an attending doctor a long time ago...there was no hospital there then. My parents took me home to the farm and a log house where the wood was in the pile, water was in the well, light was in the coaloil lamp and the loo was out back. There I lived until I was five. When I was a year and a half old, I acquired a brother. He wasn't much of a playmate for a long time, but I had a little spotted dog. He and I spent hours playing outside with an old scrub rag...he on one end and me on the other.

When I was five, we moved to Shell Lake, Saskatchewan and then back to Edmonton. I started grade one in Queens Avenue School. It no longer exists. Then we moved back to the farm and I took correspondence until our one room log school was built. There were 35 students in that school. We all washed in the same basin, drank out of the same dipper and all survived the experience. My brother was now ready to start grade one. We walked three and a half miles to school on a lonely road. In the winter, we walked in the sleigh tracks. If it drifted too much, we walked on the drifts. One cold winter night, we spent lots of time making snow angels in the banks along the road. When we got home, our mother was ready to do drastic things to us. Our father was getting ready to come and look for us. He just smiled and said, "They're home now!" In grade six, we moved again: This time five miles from school. For a while we walked then rode horseback. That began my passion for horses. What did we do for

entertainment? In the summer, we played ball and rode horseback. In the winter, we rode horseback, hauled wood (that was our job) and danced old time square dancing in our local school.

After finishing high school in Lac La Biche, I went to the University to take the Junior E Teaching Program and then went back to Lac La Biche to teach. Seven miles off the highway, was Old Trail School. They needed a teacher. My superintendent thought that I would survive there. It was the experience of my life. It was a one room log school with a teacherage that had no insulation. If if rained too much or snowed too much, I stayed because the road was impassable. Water was in the well, wood in the bush (not in the pile), the saw hung on the wall and the coaloil lamp was on the desk. I've been here before. I had eleven students in grades one to seven. Each night. I stayed in the school until seven at night with my dog and the coaloil lamp and filled the black boards for tomorrow. The last thing before going was the banking of the stove in the school or else we would freeze to death until noon tomorrow. One weekend, I stayed there alone with the dog. The following Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the temperature was -31 degrees F. and a windchill. Not a kid turned up. After five days of this solitude, the walls were beginning to talk. One family had nine kids (not all in school). One Friday night, they came with the team and wagon to take me to a house party at the



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neighbours. We danced old time square dancing until six o'clock in the morning. These same neighbours had a huge collie dog. Periodically, in the night, he would get off this tether, come and swing off anything that might be on the clothes line. The following spring, my dad came to get me on Friday night. He arrived just in time to help put out a forest fire that was hoping to burn down the place. People tell me that the teacherage finally burned but the old school still stands. When June came, I was prepared to go back. However, my superintendent thought that I should go to Grassland to teach grade three. Two years I was there. It wasn't nearly as exciting.

Then I came to Edmonton. Westmount was the first school. I will never forget it. It was a big school in those days and a new adventure. The first morning, I met a man on the steps. I said to him, "Are you the principal?" He said, "No, I'm the caretaker." I never was good at judging those kind of things. After teaching grade two there for five yeas, I moved to Mount Royal and taught Grade five and Phys. Ed. At the time, the W.P.Wagner program was in the planning stages. Counsellors came one day to tell us about the program. I thought that looks interesting so I phoned the Principal. He said, "I need someone who can handle theses kids and write program." The kids were fun. Did program get done? Yes, eventually after much trial and error. I seem to have a knack of wandering into things that I know nothing about. The next twelve years in the Wagner Program were the most rewarding of all. Each day was a new challenge and lots of laughs.

Some where in those years, I took one year of modern square dancing with Jim Lindsey and then got away from it. Somewhere too, I acquired a seven year old horse. He had a personality all his own. He dumped me several times, left a few bruises and finally broke my arm.

Did I keep him? Yes.

After twelve years in Wagner, we moved to the farm in Mannville for one year. Horse went too. When I came back, horse came too. This time, I taught at L.Y.Cairns School for eight years and then retire. By this time I've had old horse for 25 years. He was now 33. He was very arthritic and life was not pleasant any more so the vet put him down. It was a great loss.

Somewhere in those years, I discovered that I like to grow things. Gardening is now a passion. Do I grow peas? No. Food for the body I can buy in the store. Flowers are food for the soul and are worth every minute that they require.

After I retired, I started square dancing at S.E.E.S.A. because it was close. Ernie Power was my first caller and teacher. He thought that I should go to Singles. I wasn't there long when the singles crew decided that I should be president because there was no one else who would do it. Did I want to do it? No. Do I regret it? No, it has been a rewarding experience. At about this time. Bob Johnson was president of the EDSDA. Irene Anderson was publicity. She wanted some help. Bob suggested that she phone me. For one year, I was her assistant and then she decided that she didn't want it any more and I could do it. Did I want to do this? No. Did I know anything about it? No. Time is a wonderful teacher. I do enjoy the square dancing and publicity. Nothing is more thrilling that gathering square dancers from all over and going somewhere to dance. Square dancers seem to have some kind of a special happiness energy that keeps me going. Looking back at where I've been, I realize that I'm a survivor and will get through most anything...hopefully a little wiser. Each day only brings new adventure. I think that this exceeds one page.









Norris Leigh Tomlinson

May 04, 1929 - March 31, 2016

Norris was born in Hardisty, Alberta, the oldest of four children. He attended a one room country school with grades one to nine and then graduated from Irma High School. Norris continued his education at the Vermilion School of Agriculture and graduated in 1951. After graduation he continued farming with his brother on the family farm south of Irma for an additional six years.

On December 18, 1957, Norris became a railroad policeman and spent over thirty years with the Canadian National Railway. He was a guard for the 1959 Royal Train in Kamloops, an instructor for new police recruits, a member of the CN First Aid investigation team that won several trophies and he received CN awards in recognition of service. Norris retired in 1988.


Mabel and her husband, Enice, first started square dancing with the Duffield Circle Eights where Ivan Sheppy was calling. They joined Sherbrooke

They had a great love for young people, even though they had no children of their own. They were very active with the Teen-Eighters Club. They were chaperones for most of their dances. Our Beloved M.om


April 9, 1925 - August 5, 2016







Bob Weller ~ Calling History

As requested here is the write up about my career in square dancing:

I STARTED SQUARE DANCING IN 1954, MY MOTHER AND DAD WERE THE CALLERS FOR THE CENTENNIAL HOEDOWN CLUB IN SAULT STE MARIE. MY FATHER HAD BEEN TRANSFERRED FROM DRUMHELLER TO SAULT STE. MARIE THE YEAR BEFORE AND INTRODUCED MODERN SQUARE DANCING TO THE AREA. HIS FIRST CLASS IN 1954 HAD ABOUT 6 SQUARES IN IT BUT, AS IT HAS ALWAYS BEEN IT SEEMS, THERE WERE MANY MORE WOMEN THAN MEN IN THE CLASS SO THE SONS OF THOSE DANCERS IN ATTENDANCE WERE CONSCRIPTED TO LEARN SQUARE DANCING. I DID ENJOY THE LEARNING ASPECT OF THE CLASSES AS WELL AS THE SOCIAL ASPECTS.

IN THOSE DAYS THE LESSONS LASTED TEN WEEKS AND THE CLUB HELD THREE CLASSES A YEAR . EACH OF THE CLASSES WAS TOP HEAVY WITH WOMEN WANTING TO LEARN SO IT ENDED UP I TOOK THREE CLASSES A YEAR FOR SEVERAL YEARS.

MY DAD USED TO LEAVE HIS SOUND SYSTEM SET UP IN THE BASEMENT SO HE COULD PRACTICE, WHEN HE WASN'T AROUND I WOULD LEARN THE DANCES AS WELL. IN 1956 MY FATHER LET ME CALL ONE TIP A NIGHT AT THE CLUB [USUALLY A COUPLE OF SINGING CALLS] THIS CONTINUED ON FOR A COUPLE OF YEARS UNTIL I DECIDED TO BUY MY OWN SOUND SYSTEM AND RECORDS.

IN THE FALL OF 1958 A SITUATION AROSE WHERE MY DAD HAD A SERIOUS PROBLEM AT WORK AND HE TOLD ME I WOULD HAVE TO DO THE CLUB THAT NIGHT, SO I WAS THRUST INTO A CALLING SITUATION AT THE AGE OF 17. THAT FALL I TOOK MY FIRST CALLING SEMINAR THAT WAS RUN BY ED GILMORE & FRANK LANE. THIS WAS HELD IN TORONTO IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE 5TH ATLANTIC SQUARE DANCE CONVENTION AT THE ROYAL YORK HOTEL.

IN THE SPRING OF 1959 I STARTED MY OWN GROUP WHICH WAS A GATHERING OF FOLKS THAT HAD SOME DIFFICULTIES IN LEARNING THROUGH THE CLASSES. I ENDED UP WITH BETTER THAN FOUR SQUARES IN A GROUP WE CALLED OURSELVES THE "LOW LEVEL DEVILS" LALSO CALLED FOR A GROUP TWICE A MONTH IN SAULT STE MARIE MICHIGAN FOR TWO YEARS.

IN 1966 I WAS MARRIED WITH THREE LITTLE ONES AND WE DECIDED TO MOVE BACK TO ALBERTA. [EDMONTON WAS MY BIRTHPLACE] I JOINED THE EDMONTON CALLERS ASSOCIATION IN 1967. OVER THE YEARS I CALLED FOR AND TAUGHT AT MANY CLUBS. IN THE EARLY SEVENTIES BECAUSE OF ISSUES WITHIN MY MARRIAGE I TOOK A HIATUS FROM SQUARE DANCING AND WHEN THINGS STABILIZED I STEPPED BACK AND LOOKED AT WHICH PART OF THE SQUARE DANCE ACTIVITY DID I GET MOST OF MY PLEASURE FROM AND I DECIDED TO CONCENTRATE ON NEW DANCERS CLASSES.

MY FIRST CLASS I TAUGHT AFTER COMING BACK WAS FOR A GROUP CALLED THE SAINTS "N" SINNERS IN SAINT ALBERT. I THINK THAT OVER THE NEXT FEW YEARS I CALLED AS A GUEST CALLER AT THE MAJORITY OF CLUBS IN THE EDMONTON AREA. IN THE EARLY EIGHTIES I CALLED FOR A GROUP AT NEW SAREPTA CALLED THE HAPPY HOMESTEADERS, I THINK I CALLED FOR THEM FOR ABOUT EIGHT YEARS, I ALSO TOOK OVER A GROUP ON THE SOUTH SIDE CALLED THE STARLITERS AS WELL I TAUGHT THE NEW DANCERS FOR THREE YEARS FOR THE SINGLES .I ALSO CALLED FOR THE MERRY MIXERS IN FORT SASKATCHWAN

IN THE EARLY NINETIES I STARTED CALLING FOR THE CHERHILL CHAINERS WHICH I CALLED FOR UNTIL MAY 2015, I ALSO TAUGHT AND CALLED FOR CLUBS INFORT ASSINIBOINE, BARRHEAD, MAYERTHORPE AND WHITECOURT ONE YEAR I CALLED 302 NIGHTS INCLUDING GUEST CALLING.

LOOKING BACK OVER THE YEARS I GUEST CALLED ALL OVER CENTRAL AND WESTERN CANADA AS WELL AS FOURTEEN OR FIFTEEN STATES. I HAVE CALLED AT MULTIPLE CONVENTIONS IN CANADA AND THE U.S. AND HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN MANY SQUARE DANCE VACATION PACKAGES IN CANADA AND THE U.S. INCLUDED WERE SIXTEEN YEARS AT PENTICTON.






Ernie Williams (1915 - 2004) square dancer 1953-2004

April 5, 1926 ~ September 2, 2014

On April 5th, 1926 Jessie Zelkovich was born to parents Louis and Florence Zelkovich in Edson, Alberta. During WWII there was great concern that the Magnolia Railroad Bridge would be sabotaged so the Federal Government hired four WWI veterans, known as Veteran Guards of Canada, to guard the bridge. Thus in 1939 Louis Zelkovich, along with Roland Ryley, Dennis McCafferty and Dave Churchill were installed at Magnolia. In 1940 Louis moved his family to Magnolia. They settled in a small house by the Sturgeon creek in Magnolia, located just a short distance from the Railroad Bridge, and later built a home at the corner of Highway 16 and Magnolia Corner. After the war was over the family moved to Edmonton, Alberta.

Jessie by this time had met Carl Anderson, son of Swedish pioneers of Magnolia, at a dance and later at ball games. They were married in St. Faiths Anglican Church, Edmonton, Alberta on November 15, 1945. In due course four children were born to them: Carol - October 10, 1946, Katherine - April 29, 1949, Danny - May 28, 1953 and Lorne - February 12, 1957.


After the local store burned down in 1958, the telephone was installed in Carl and Jessie's house and Jessie became the local operator. She was paid to deliver messages to neighbours. Sadness struck the family when Danny passed away June 26, 1955 at the age of 2 years. Four years later on October 28, 1959, Carl succumbed to polio. The family was devastated and Jessie was left with 3 young children to raise on her own.

Jessie had started square dancing in 1955 with her first husband, Carl Anderson, in Magnolia, Alberta, with the Patty Cake Partners. They were avid square and round dancers and members of the Duffield Circle 8's, Seba Beach Swingers, Northgate Rounders, Extra Dance. Many trips were made to the Peach Festival at Penticton, B.C. and the Square Dance Jamboree held there; 34 to be exact (one of them for their honeymoon). They also attended 34 Provincial Square Dance Conventions, 4 National Conventions, plus there were many Wandering Squares campouts and visits to many clubs in Edmonton and surrounding areas. They strongly supported Lorne's calling activities, frequently attending the clubs/dances where he called.

In 1973 Jessie, Ernie and Lorne moved to Stony Plain. While Ernie was still driving school bus Jessie worked for a few years at the Stony Plain Reporter in the front office. Soon they would both retire and enjoy a more relaxing way of life. Ernie and Jessie also enjoyed golfing and belonged to the Seniors Bowling League in Spruce Grove, Alberta.


